"Copeland" has been exhibited at the Bow Bow Show, Arts Central, Meekering Art Gallery and Hastings Library.

It will now be packed up for its final journey to Warragul's sister city of Ritsing, China, where it will form part of a cultural exchange in August.

Carers miss out in "family" budget

The cost of payment of up to \$1000 to carers of disabled people announced in last week's Federal Budget did not sway the Copeland Care Association's view that the government had "abandoned those most in need".

A token handout of a few dollars to carers does not answer the Howard government," CCA president Steve Tops said.

The disabled people with severe and profound developmental disabilities were the biggest losers from the budget that also imposed no pressure for ageing pension rates.

Member for McMillan Russell Broadbent said about 3000 carers in Victoria would receive the \$1000 payment.

But Mr Tops believes the "so-called family budget" has gone on handouts caring for severely and profoundly disabled children and adults" and said the announced billings were families' "biggest hit" to the government at the election due later this year.

Mr Broadbent said about 13,500 pensioners would also benefit from one-off payments.

These would be \$200 for a single pensioner and \$300 for a couple.

The amounts would be automatically paid to pensioners - they do not have to apply - but had a Commonwealth senior health concession card or a Department of Veterans Affairs gold card, Mr Broadbent said.

He said he particularly welcomed the budget's assistance to families, elderly persons and for improvements to local infrastructure.

He referred specifically to education funding, an increase in childcare payments and changes to the rebate for use of private childcare expenses.

Also disappointed with the budget was the Rural Doctors Association of Australia's president Dr Peter Rosenthal following a lack of funds to retain rural medical graduates in work placement posts.

"We need to look at the bigger picture and recognise that our medical work force is struggling to provide services to a very tough to rural communities," he said.

The Rosenthal said health concerns for rural Australia would continue to flourish unless the right infrastructure was put in place to teach and train graduates.
